The Report of the Parish Finances for 2019 is published and is available at the back of the Church. The Committee thanks you wholeheartedly for your support during the past year and counts on that support for the future.

The Roadmap for reopening Society and Business: At last our Churches have opened for Masses with you, the People of God joining physically. It is wonderful that we will gather together in the 'Teach an Phobail' once more. There is an element of anxiety, like when shops and offices reopen, as we seek to make sure that all who gather are safe from the corona virus, and so we must put some guidelines in place.

- As we move forward take it for granted that things will change from week to week as we try to see what works best for everybody. So do keep an eye on the Newsletter.

- Much as we would want to return to Mass, firstly remember that people who are vulnerable or unwell, and especially those with any symptoms that might suggest Coid-19 infection, should stay at home and, if possible, participate, as now, via webcam, social media, television or radio. The same applies to those who have been in recent contact with someone who has the virus, in accordance with public health advice.

- Coming to Church, departing, and while there, we must maintain physical distance from each other (currently at least 2 metres). So, Church seating will be based on this guideline. Whereas we could take about 90 people, only 50 people will be admitted to the Church for Mass at this time, according to State regulations. Those coming will be asked for their names and telephone number, to help tracing if there should be an occurrence of the virus in the area. We will have stewards on hand to help in this regard. For that reason, please come to Church in good time.

- Once the number threshold is reached, others will be asked to remain outside – to join in the prayer in the Church grounds or listen to the car radio.

- Good hand hygiene and respiratory etiquette will be essential. Why not wear a mask! The PPC and stewards will see to regular cleaning and sanitising of shared spaces.

- To protect physical distancing, we won't call on our wonderful servers for the moment.

- At all times Eucharistic Ministers will give Communion in the hand. For those who remain outside during Mass, Communion will be distributed at the Church steps.

- Collection baskets won't be passed around during Mass. The congregation is asked to make its contributions at the box at the door instead.

- The toilets at the Church will be locked and opened at the times of Church services. Otherwise we are unable to maintain a proper level of sanitation.
