**The Plan for living with Covid-19** At Level 2, most areas of economy and society, for example: schools, restaurants, pubs and gyms, are open. The priority is to keep schools and childcare facilities open and minimise disruption in the work force. In order to keep people safe, you will be asked to limit the number of people you meet. For Religious Services in places of worship (including funerals), up to 50 can be admitted, with social distancing, etc. Face coverings are requested. The limit of 6 is for indoor settings in homes and applies to funeral related events in private homes (e.g. wakes, etc). Up to 50 guests can gather for weddings and receptions. Much as we would want to return to Mass, firstly remember that people who are vulnerable or unwell, and especially those with any symptoms that might suggest corona virus infection, or have been in contact with someone who has had the virus, should stay at home and participate, as now, via webcam, social media, television or radio.

**Season of creation** As the corona virus pandemic continues to challenge our world we continue to celebrate the season of creation and the 5th anniversary of Pope Francis prophetic Encyclical Letter Laudato Si. We are surely being invited to ponder the beauty and fragility of the gift we have been given in Mother Earth. It is encouraging to see so many people' take personal and corporate action to care for our common home aware of the hospitality of the earth. ' (Laudato Si). What action can I take that will make a difference in my caring for the common home as I walk around and observe the beauty. How do I recycle, dispose of rubbish, use disposables, plastic etc?

*No punishment? Is there no punishment for the sinner? We can say that there is. The sinner basically punishes himself. The punishment is built into the very sinfulness. This is what Ezekiel is saying this weekend. 'Listen, House of Israel: is what I do unjust?' It is not altogether uncommon to hear people complain that God is unjust to them. But God responds that a good person who violates his own integrity to do something evil dies in sin, precisely as a result of the evil he has done. Our self-seeking, hate, anger, aggression, violence, jealousy etc all lead to isolation, loneliness, hostility with others and often to physical and mental stress and breakdowns. Sin, which is a refusal to respond to God loving us, brings its own inevitable punishment. Our sins often leave wounds which take a long time to heal. God does not need to punish us; we do that very well by our own choices.*

*We need to identify where sin really lies. Sin is not just a violation of a rule or a law. It is a violation of our very nature. To act with violence, to steal, to fornicate, to lie, to be avaricious are regarded as sins. But why? Are they sins because the Church says they are? Something is sinful because it is wrong. It denies love and respect for God and for the dignity, the rights and integrity of others. They are sins not only of Catholics but of anyone who does them. Sin, as a violation of our needed relationship with God, Truth and Love, brings nothing but pain and loss. We have no one to blame but ourselves. (Sacred Space)*

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
