In this Sunday's Gospel, those who listen to Jesus' teaching in the synagogue know there is something different and exciting about him. His teaching is in sharp contrast to the scribes they are used to hearing and makes a deep impression on them. The difference is his authority, and it leaves his listeners 'astonished'. He does not use his position the way we might use our authority to make ourselves look good. Instead he uses his authority to serve, to love, and to bring mercy and freedom.
