Reminder from the HSE for everyone aged 60 and over to register for their vaccine through the HSE's online registration system or on the phone with HSELive from Friday 23 April. However, before we do, we want to remind those aged 65-69 who have yet to register to make sure to register as soon as possible. Everyone in this age group is now eligible to register including: frontline healthcare workers who haven't gotten an appointment through their workplace and people aged 65-69 who have a health condition that puts them at very high risk (vaccine allocation Group 4) and who haven't been given an appointment through their hospital or healthcare team. People in this age group who are registering online will need: their Personal Public Service Number (PPSN), their Eircode, an email address or a mobile phone number. A friend or family member can help. If someone is finding it difficult to go online and register they can ring HSELive for support on 1850 24 1850 or 01 240 8787 from 8am to 8pm, 7 days. If a person doesn't have a PPSN they can register on the phone with HSElive. Once registered the person will receive their vaccine appointment for the COVID-19 AstraZeneca vaccine. Currently a Covid-19 statutory instrument, published in Iris Oifigiuil recently, makes it a criminal offence to attend certain types of indoor events or gatherings, including religious services other than weddings or funerals. The penalty for breaches of the new law are a fine of €127 or up to six months in jail. This past week the Taoiseach has written to the Bishops to say that the reopening of Churches for public worship will be given 'careful and positive consideration' at Government discussions next week on easing restrictions in May. The Taoiseach remarks in his letter on the comprehensive measures in place when Churches were last opened for congregational worship. Bishop Nulty, our Diocesan Administrator, reminds us that from Monday the number of people allowed to attend Funeral services rises to 25.

Adoration: during the current restrictions we've held Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament on Sunday afternoon. As restrictions are relaxed – please God – we will transfer the Exposition to Monday afternoon, beginning Monday 10th May. Sunday may be a time when families get the opportunity to meet and spend time together, an important element of the Lord's Day.

Basically the Bishops are looking for the best way to embark on and engage you and I in a conversation about the Church in Ireland and the way forward. For the present, how might this be best done.
