The woman in the Gospel today, after many years of suffering and isolation, would have been satisfied with a 'quick fix', simply touching Jesus' clothes, and then slinking off quietly. Jesus didn't go in for that kind of healing. He always dealt with people on a personal level. He knew the woman needed not just a physical healing, but psychological and spiritual healing also. After all the years of sickness she was feeling bad about herself and alienated from God too. Jesus let her know he was happy for her. He confirmed the fact that she was healed. This would have given her comfort and assurance.

In therapy and healing the problem is always the whole person, never the symptom alone. Questions must be asked which challenge the whole personality. It is not just the arm or leg that is being treated, but a person. Jesus never healed just an illness; he healed a sick person. His words healed the spirit; his touch healed the body.

Each of us is capable of doing some healing, because we have eyes that can see, ears that can hear, tongues that can speak, hands that can touch, and above all a heart that can love. Lord, make us instruments of your healing power. Where there is hatred, let us sow love. Where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; and where there is sadness, joy. Amen.
