First Communions / Confirmations: Our second day of First Communions is this Saturday. Confirmation will be on Saturday 2^{nd} October, with two celebrations, at 10.15 and 12 midday.

Re-opening Ireland: Thank you for your efforts to play your part in re-opening Ireland. The numbers permitted by the State to gather for Church Ceremonies is extended to 50% of venue capacity. Our stewards, to whom we're very grateful for their service, will guide us in this regard.

Meanwhile, we remember that we still need to observe social distancing inside and outside our Churches. Facemasks must be worn at all Masses and ceremonies. Please use the hand sanitizer as you enter the Church. For Communion in the Parish Church, please continue to observe the one-way system – up the centre aisle and down the sides, beginning with those in the centre aisle. Communion is given in the hand only. And do take your copy of the Mass leaflet home. We look forward to celebrating the Sacrament of Confirmation in Thomastown next weekend. We want to assure the families of the young people that great care is taken in our Churches to

make sure that they are safe places, and remind the families involved with the Sacrament to make sure that family celebrations adhere to the advice given to keep the country safe. On Wednesdays 6th Class students will join us for Mass. As their day starts at 9.10, we'll bring Wednesday Mass forward to facilitate them.

The First Friday of each month is associated in parishes with bringing Holy Communion to those who are unable to come to Church to receive the Sacrament. During the shut-down of the country it became apparent that many people missed the opportunity to receive Holy Communion regularly. It means a lot to so many. Fr. Dan and Sister Anna will bring Communion this week to the people on the 'regular' list. The problem of riches is one of the great secrets in capitalist Christianity. We are probably members of a wealthy church. Money may be our biggest difficulty. Marx called it our "jealous god," who can tolerate no other deity. Money has immense power. It is almost sacramental. It gets us acceptance into the real world. It purchases persons. Money becomes evil when rights are not balanced by responsibilities, and responsibilities are not balanced by rights. When these are balanced, money can do a great deal of good – both for the giver and the receiver, and hopefully for others. There's surely nothing bad about that. This interpretation keeps us from wrongly framing the issue, as so many have done in history- by making the rich or the poor inherently bad or inherently virtuous. Individuals in both economic groups can be materialistic consumers or generous-hearted givers, just at their own scale. St. Paul never said money is the root of all evil. He said 'the love of money is the root of all evils. (Richard Rohr).
