**What's in a name?** Names are important in Christian terms. We ask at Baptism that at least one of the names chosen be that of a Christian saint, and we ask at Confirmation that a saints name be chosen also. Saints are chosen because they have lived good lives. They have been faithful followers of Jesus, and their example provides us with good role models. They will also, we believe, act as intercessors – putting in a good word for us with God.

This weekend several people will be canonised – sainted – in Rome. Pope Francis will canonise **Charles De Foucauld.** He was French, a member of the French Foreign Legion, an explorer and cartographer of the Sahara Desert. He had a conversion experience, became a priest and hermit in the Sahara Desert, living a life of prayer, a 'brother' to the native Moslems. He was killed by bandits on 1st December 1916.

Devasahayam Pillai, a Brahmin in India, became a Catholic, and took the name **Lazarus**. He insisted on the equality of all people, despite caste differences. He was shot in 1749. **Cesar de Bus** lived in France and was a catechist.

**Luigi Maria Palazzolo**, an Italian parish priest, dedicated his life to abandoned, orphaned, and neglected children. He died in 1886.

Giustino Maria Russolillo lived in the last century and founded a religious congregation which encouraged and supported those discerning a call to religious life and priesthood. Maria Francesca di Gesu was an Italian religious sister. She went to Uruguay and Argentina as a missionary, beginning a mission in the rain forest. She died in 1904. Maria Domenica Mantovani founded a group of religious women, who are still dedicated to serving children and youth, families, priests, the elderly and the disabled in parishes. We can see how there are role models in that group of new saints. Befriend one of them and he or she would put in a good word for us with God.
