This week we call to mind the life of St. John Vianney. St. John was born in France in 1786 at the height of the Anticlerical "Reign of Terror". At a time when religion was being rejected by much of the public, St. John saw them as heroes. St. John received his Communion and Confirmation in secret. His education suffered as a result of the French Revolution, and he struggled with Latin in particular. In 1809, John was drafted into the armies of Napoleon Bonaparte as Napoleon had withdrawn the exemption of Ecclesiastical students to avoid service. He soon left the army. In 1815, John Vianney was ordained as a priest and quickly became Parish Priest. He was concerned with the lack of attention lay people paid to the Church because of the revolution, with many drinking and dancing and working on Sundays. He spent 11 to 12 hours daily helping people connect with God. Eventually, up to 20,000 pilgrims would travel to meet him. St. John Vianney is remembered as a champion of the poor. We can all draw inspiration from the devotion of St. John Vianney. His relentless drive to connect with God, at a time when it would threaten his life, is truly awe inspiring. St. John Vianney would often say: "Private prayer is like straw scattered here and there: If you set it on fire, it makes a lot of little flames. But gather these straws into a bundle and light them, and you get a mighty fire, rising like a column into the sky; public prayer is like that."
